"Our eyes were opened, but too late."	The Jews of Sighet have been deported from the ghetto and placed in cattle wagons. They are now traveling towards an unknown destination.	Elie contemplates how the Jews of Sighet remained optimistic throughout the beginning of the novel as little by little the Germans take away their freedom. It is at this very moment that they let go of the illusion that has propelled that optimism. As they are leaving Hungary, they are losing confidence about where they are headed and how they will be treated.	The quote has a nostalgic tone. Wiesel references a few other times when they realized what different choices they might have made in retrospect, after the war. For example, when he and his father decide to evacuate, he later learned that the camp was liberated. In this case, they had not listened to the warnings of Moche the Beadle and fled before the Germans came.
"Jews, listen to me. It's all I ask of you. I don't want money or pity. Only listen to me."
